Opening of Mary's Lodge, which replaces Gimpl Dining Hall. It's the culmination of three years of fundraising and collaborative work with the capital campaign committee, building committee, architects and our staff. This new building is a dream come true and an incredible blessing. We are extremely grateful to all of you, our friends and supporters, who have encouraged us along the way.

 The Franz Finley Welcome Center has been mostly funded by the late Elsie Franz Finley in the amount of \$1.8 million. This \$2.4 million new structure will include a health center, year-round offices for CYO/

Camp Howard staff, public restrooms, meeting space and larger camp store.

· Finally, we have received gifts in the amount of \$1 million toward a new chapel, to be located where the present Gimpl Dining Hall sits. An anonymous donor gave \$500,000, which was followed by a \$500,000 gift from Elsie Franz Finley. We will be working to complete fundraising for this new building soon.



# CYO helped convert take the plunge

Catholic Youth Organization's support and love helped bring Stephanie Piering into the Catholic faith, and a few months later a scholarship allowed her daughter to attend faith-infused Camp Howard

"Sport trains body and spirit for perseverance, effort, courage, balance, sacrifice, honesty, friendship and collaboration," said St. John Paul II during a 1984 homily at the Olympic stadium

And, sometimes, sports lead people home.

Such was the case for Stephanie Piering, whose experience with Catholic Youth Organization athletics gave her the final momentum needed to enter the church.

"When you are going through a conversion, you have lots of questions you need answered along the way," said Piering, coach of the CYO swim team at St. Rose School in Northeast Portland. "CYO — with the community, the support and the love people show each other — it answered my final questions somehow," Piering said. "It felt like I was always meant to be there, in the Catholic Church."

Piering signed on to coach swimming three years ago due to her water-loving daughter, Ivy — a pivotal person in the spiritual homecoming.

Six years ago, Ivy, a student at St. Rose, decided she wanted to be Catholic, and to support that decision Piering began taking her to Mass.

Because her husband, Jeff, is a cradle Catholic, Piering had long been intrigued by Catholicism. But while Jeff had fallen away from his faith over the years, Piering's interest in Catholicism grew while attending Mass with Ivy.

Then as a CYO coach, "everything came together," said Piering. "I felt the Holy Spirit; it was amazing."This past spring, Piering received the sacraments at the Easter Vigil.

Angie Godfrey, a parishioner of St. Rose who leads dryland training for the swim team, said that as soon as Piering became coach, she brought"her strong generosity of spirit and service" to the role. Piering arranged community service opportunities for the athletes and their parents and led prayers before

and after practice. Last year she gave as prizes whistles that contained a small prayer to the Holy Spirit. She's also given the swimmers holy medals and handmade prayer cards.

Piering made sure "our team's focus always is on Jesus," Godfrey said.

Yet there was a visible difference when her friend became Catholic, said Godfrey. "You could see something was deepening inside her."

Godfrey calls Piering an inspiration. "She's full of such love for the church, and I just love being around her."

Mitch Ratigan, St. Rose athletic director, said in addition to helping grow the CYO swimming program to nearly 60 athletes, Piering embodies the lessons of CYO, "lessons that go hand in hand with what we are trying to teach at church, at school and in the home."

Jeff, who eventually made his way back to the church, has witnessed that the lessons and values of CYO ripple out into the wider community.

"CYO is crucial in promoting fraternity and compassion among not only the members but its interactions with all those it comes in contact with,"he

said."It is a handshake or hug in an often self-serving, isolationist, jaded society."

Now that the entire family has embraced the Catholic faith, it was especially meaningful that Ivy could attend Camp Howard this year.

"She's been asking if she can go," and it's one of those things that we wouldn't have been able to do without help," said Piering. Help came in the form of a scholarship, made possible through funds from the annual CYO Champions of Faith dinner.

Ivy went with three friends from St. Rose and had a blast.

"It was fun, unique, welcoming," said Ivy, now a sixth-grader.

"What a wonderful feeling to know that not only would she have a great time and be safe at camp, but that there would be faith there," Piering said.

It's that same mix of spirituality-infused fun that Piering will provide her CYO athletes this year as they stretch on swim caps, grab their goggles and plunge into the pool for a new season.

The Dooneys were incredible in their ability to organize and rally their friends to support us. We shared many laughs and successes working on the event.

As I think back on Sean and why he was so special to me, it's his deep love for his family. He enjoyed good wholesome outdoor fun with family and friends. He loved his kids and made wonderful memories for them throughout every year. Those lucky

enough to tag along from time to time were always treated to a slice of their heaven. Sean was like a brother to me, and I had the opportunity to tell him so in February of this year.

Sean, in his humility, would not have imagined the turnout at his funeral Mass. Sean filled St. Mary Cathedral in Portland with nearly 2,000 attendees. He will always live on in my heart as he will in others. Sean Dooney was a remarkable friend to CYO/Camp Howard and to me.

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

she says.

For her part, in addition to her work as principal and wealth manager for Northwest Investment Counselors, Michelle is on the ministries board and chairwoman of the investment committee for the Sisters of St. Mary of Oregon.

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# 'Faith takes you through all adversity

Blazer player and now Pilot coach, Terry Porter knows ingredients to success

There were 42 seconds left in the game. Trail Blazer Clyde Drexler led a fast break in Washington's Tacoma Dome and fed the ball to a streaking Terry Porter, who nailed a reverse layup. After trailing the Seattle Super-Sonics by 19 at halftime, Porter's basket gave Portland the lead for good.

The point guard's "incredibly good aim" — such as that displayed in this memorable March 1991 contest — made him a favorite player of Sister Krista von Borstel, executive director of CYO/Camp Howard, and countless Rip City hoops fans.

But Porter's sparkle is not just his skill. He's "always been a Blazer hero on and off the court," said Sister Krista.

Porter is a strong advocate for various community and charitable organizations. He is a board member at Doernbecher Children's Hospital and created a college scholarship fund for minority students.

In his 17-year NBA career, he earned a reputation as a smart player who outworked more talented opponents. After his playing days ended, Porter had several NBA coaching stints before being named head men's basketball coach at the University of Portland in 2016. At U.P. he offers lessons that

spring from his faith.

"Faith takes you through all adversity," said Porter, raised Baptist and married to a Catholic. His three children graduated from Jesuit High School

"Your faith is that place that you can always go back to," he said. "You aren't always going to get the answers, but you trust Scripture and apply it as best you can."

The Wisconsin native is the youngest of six, and tussles helped toughen him up. "Like any little brother I was beat up, but I was also embraced," he said.

Porter believes Catholic Youth Organization sports, in which his kids participated, provide youths important life skills at the most critical time.

In a faith-infused environment, CYO players "learn what it's like to be on a team, to make sacrifices, to take on roles big and small," said Porter, this year's Champions of Faith keynote speaker.

At some point, he said, most kids will grow up and work for someone within a team setting, "so how you deal with people from diverse socioeconomic backgrounds and with different personalities — how you embrace each other and respect each other — is how you have success in life."

# New lodge increases possibilities at camp

Dining hall big enough to hold everyone

Treasure Stoffel, a former special needs camper at Camp Howard, stood high on the deck of a new lodge gazing across the forest.

"We are happy that the new dining hall is open for business," Stoffel said. "I hope and pray that the Lord will bring campers and happenings here and do a lot of stuff."

The simple but stately lodge includes fireplaces, a patio, decks and a large modern kitchen. It's built to last a century, hosting boisterous meals, hilarious skits and solemn ceremonies — the "stuff" of Camp Howard life that Stoffel and other fans cherish.

Called Mary's Lodge, the \$4.1 million, 7,580-square-foot structure replaces a 1950s dining hall that was on its "last leg," said Sister Krista von Borstel, executive director of CYO/ Camp Howard.

It took three years to raise the funds, draw up plans and finish construction.

"It is truly a dream come true to achieve this building before the old one was condemned," Sister Krista told a crowd of supporters Aug. 11 during a blessing of the lodge.

She thanked the group — including donors, staff, former counselors and many from her Sisters of St. Mary of Oregon religious community — for being "passionate" about Camp Howard.

Father Dave Gutmann, pastor of Holy Trinity Parish in Beaverton, did the blessing. His parish donated about \$70,000 for the dining hall.

"We know how you are being honored by how

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



## Franz Finley Welcome Center – a dream coming true

In November of 2017, I was invited to meet Elsie Franz Finley at her home in Vancouver, Washington. She shared a desire to learn of Catholic leaders whose dreams she could help realize while making a significant impact on the community. While sitting down with Elsie in her home, I shared the story of CYO/Camp Howard and our organization's vision. We were coming close to completing fundraising for our new Mary's Lodge at the camp, and we hadn't begun fundraising for our next project. Elsie helped turn this dream into reality by providing the lead gift to fund the Camp Howard Welcome Center targeted for construction during 2019.

The Franz Finley Welcome Center will be located in the camp's main entrance with a newly expanded parking area. The center will be in the heart of camp and close to the action. It will be a natural location for visitors' immediate access upon arrival. They will be greeted by friendly staff ready to answer their questions and direct them to camp leaders and facilities. The center will contain an improved and updated health center for all groups using the camp. It will have year-round offices and meeting space for CYO/Camp Howard staff, public restrooms and a welcome area to greet all visitors, including rental group members. Finally, it will include an updated camp store that may be open year-round.

Construction of the new center will require the removal of the old shower house and the camp store. New restrooms will replace the old Greenwood and Fircrest restrooms that have been in need of replacement for many years. The new restroom facilities in these units will include showers, eliminating the need for the 65 year-old shower house. These additional facilities are beyond the scope of the Elsie Franz Finley gift and will require additional funds to begin construction.

Elsie died last month at the age of 97. She blessed Camp Howard and many thousands of youth with her generosity. She inspired a vision for the completion of Camp Howard facilities that include future plans for a chapel and adult lodge. Her impact will be felt by generations to come. Gone from this earth, Elsie Franz Finley will not be forgotten.





For a guy who is known for his business acumen and matter-of-fact honesty, Joe Weston, 80, gives a surprisingly tender reason for supporting CYO/ Camp Howard.

"Every kid gets to play on CYO teams," he says. "There's nothing more embarrassing for a kid than having parents and grandparents come to watch them sit on the bench the whole game."

Weston, an iconic Portland real estate developer and philanthropist, didn't experience Camp Howard or CYO as a boy — "We were poor; I worked full time through high school," he says — but his

He's a strong backer of Catholic education, and worries about the cost of Catholic schools for working families. And these days, he talks about what he will leave behind, a conversation he began with himself decades ago. He's an old-fashioned supporter of opportunities for children, the working poor and his Catholic faith. He's also a man with little patience for those who aren't willing to work.

He's an inveterate supporter of CYO/ Camp Howard, in particular its Champions of Faith dinner, which raises funds for scholarships for kids who wouldn't otherwise be able to afford to play on its teams or attend Camp Howard.

Weston also backs the Catholic Youth Organization because of its leadership. Sister Krista von Borstel, CYO/Camp Howard executive director and a Sister of St. Mary of Oregon, knows how to get things done and how to garner support, he says. "CYO/Camp Howard is in good shape today because of her leadership."

The gratitude goes both ways: The Catholic Youth Organization inducted Weston into its Hall of Fame in May, "for 25 years of faithfully and generously supporting the endeavors of the CYO and Camp Howard."

Sister Krista goes farther. "He has single-handedly made a greater impact on Catholic organizations than anyone else in the greater Portland area," she says, adding that Weston is a man worth listening to. "He is one of my heroes and I let him know every once in a while."

That being the case, when Sister Krista saw that CYO/Camp Howard would need millions of dollars to build a new lodge at the camp, she went to Weston.

She told him that it was time to replace the venerable but disintegrating building that had served for decades.
